**Bacterial Infections** 

Wounds, Skin and Soft Tissue Injuries





#### **Other complications**

Poor access to sterile injecting equipment

Poor access to pharmacotherapy

Public injecting increases risks

Other drugs e.g. steroids

Previous negative experiences



Poorer health outcomes

Co-occurring conditions and intersectionality

Relationships and power dynamics

Poor pain management

Criminal justice system involvement

#### **Stigma and Discrimination**

- The World Health Organization has found that illicit drug use is the most stigmatized health condition.
- Stigma and discrimination act as barriers to accessing appropriate health care
